## A Chance For Change (C4C) Theory of Change

Spread the word events in each participant country will help us target those who have been victims of gender-based violence, particularly young women and girls from minority ethnic groups, refugees and migrant communities as we have reason to believe they are more exposed to GBV and gender discrimination.

Inputs

All stages will be overseen and receive input from youth-led focus groups (made up of members of our Youth Advisory Board) who will review the research protocol and the creation of the e-course. The Youth Advisory Board will help pilot the e-courses, critiquing and disseminating throughout the process.

All academic outputs will be screened by our international Editorial Board who will peer review the e-course and related academic materials.

Outputs

We will liaise with National Youth and Safeguarding Teams in order to ensure outputs to as many young people as possible.

At least 200 Youth workers will be trained via accredited e-courses, these courses aim at up-skilling youth workers and provide them with the tools and skills necessary to replicate the programme autonomously.

Production of regular newsletters in participating languages informing 3000 stakeholders. 100 journalists receiving press releases.

180 Youth Workers will be directly involved with implementation and testing of the platform. Each partner will have two different focus groups with at least 6 participants each and every partner is responsible of spreading the survey to at least 20 participants per partner.

100 young people attended spread the word events (20 per country)

A final e-book will be produced for free use, users will report feeling more knowledgeable about the topic and able to continue networking via project website, personal contact and the Hub.

At least 60 stakeholders attending final conference.

## **Outcomes**

By the end of the project we will have:

- Enhanced youth workers competences in relation to provide effective, relevant and high-quality services when it comes to GBV prevention and control.
- Youth-led research through accredited youth internships and volunteering
- Increased youth workers ability to empower young people to use C4C's key concepts of restorative justice and media education
- Produced a youth-led educational, training and skills development programme on GBV
- Hold a CPD accredited conference with young people and stakeholders brought together.
- Delivered online awareness activities to relevant stakeholders

Reported increased awareness of GBV in the areas where each participant organisation is established

Uptake of e-courses and completed accredited training

Increase in the number of CPD accreditations awarded to young people and youth workers

Increase young people's awareness of their rights and responsibilities particularly pertaining GBV, discrimination, exclusion and abuse.
